The mission of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is to equip leaders to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church.

Purpose of the Course and Core Value Focus

The purpose of this course is to provide quality theological education for students in the area of discipleship strategies in the context of the local church. The course will emphasize the seminary's current core value focus assigned annually by the Administrative Council.

Characteristic Excellence -- What we do, we do to the utmost of our abilities and resources as a testimony to the glory of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Curriculum Competencies Addressed

This course will address the following curriculum competencies:

- 1. *Interpersonal Skills:* Understand how to build relationships with other ministry leaders within the local church.
- 2. *Servant Leadership:* Determine how the Senior Pastor, staff members, and lay leaders can serve one another while still providing the appropriate leadership required.
- 3. *Spiritual and Character Formation:* As a leadership team intentionally "grow up in all things into Him who is the head Christ" (Eph. 4:15b, NKJV).

Course Description

This course is designed to equip students for leading discipleship ministries in a local church by exploring a variety of methods and approaches used in a response to the Great Commission mandate in churches today. Students are exposed to select and different materials and methods of discipleship in correlation to the Bible Study programs in local churches to provide basis for future adaptation. The student is also introduced to developmental processes currently available.

Learning Objectives

This course is designed to introduce students to the basic principles, procedures, guidelines, and available resources for discipleship strategies within the local church. The student involved in this process should be able to accomplish the following:

- Examine a variety of discipleship strategies that can be utilized in local church praxis.
- Understand and be able to discuss foundational concepts related to current developmental processes for various age groups.
- Value/Appreciate the importance of the discipleship mandate given to all believers in Scripture.
- Develop a discipleship strategy, which can be implemented in the student's specific ministry setting.

Course Teaching Methodology

This course will utilize group discussion and an interactive discovery-learning format.

Biblical Overview of Discipleship Paper – 25 points

Write 8-10 page paper discussing the Biblical mandate for discipleship. Also, include an overview of Old Testament and New Testament examples of discipleship. Discuss how this mandate and the examples you include are applicable to the local church. Use at least 8 sources not including the Bible, preferably scholarly books including commentaries.

Profile for Discipleship Strategy Context Paper – 25 points

Create a profile identifying the context for the development of a discipleship strategy (the next assignment). Include a detailed description of the setting for the strategy (geographic location, ministry setting, needs, etc.) and a detailed description of the individuals involved in the process (age, developmental needs, gender, etc.). This profile should guide your understanding, evaluation, research, and development of your discipleship strategy. Present your findings in a 8-10 page paper. Pay close attention to the Assignment Formatting section of this syllabus!

Discipleship Strategy Development – 25 points

Based on the discipleship strategies and the foundational concepts of development laid in class, the Biblical foundations and mandates of discipleship discussed in your Biblical Overview of Discipleship paper, the context profile you created, and personal research, develop a discipleship strategy which can be implemented in your specific ministry setting. Write a 5-page paper, which provides an overview, explanation and rationale for your strategy. Also, include an 8-week detailed description for how to implement your strategy (which can either include planning processes or curriculum and content materials, etc.).

Reading Quizzes

Quizzes will be given to test the student's comprehension of the textbook readings. These quizzes will be posted on Blackboard throughout the semester.

Classroom and Online Decorum

Online participation is determined by postings and responses in the Threaded Discussions held each week. These discussions will be related to the material covered in each week's content. All students are required to post a minimum of three responses in the main discussion each week: one in answer to the presenting questions, and two in response to classmates' postings. in order for the threaded discussion to be of maximum benefit to everyone involved it is recommended that you stay as close to the course schedule as possible—so that everyone will participate in the discussion in the same week. Late postings will be penalized one point for each day late. Please limit discussions in this venue to the assigned topic. Students may e-mail or use the miscellaneous forum to discuss other topics with your classmates.

Course Policies

Absences

In this course, there are no allotted classroom absences. Arriving late or leaving early from a class will equal an absence. *Please be faithful!!!*
