Course Description

This course is designed to thoroughly discuss the nature of witnessing, the personal character of the witness, and the process of witnessing in order to empower women as personal witnesses and as leaders in witness training.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the completion of the course, each student will be able to:

- 1. Explore the nature of witnessing.
- 2. Understand how to be an effective witness.
- 3. Be familiar with witness training resources.
- 4. Implement strategies for evangelistic appeals and evangelistic events in her church women's ministry.

Course Teaching Methodology

The course will involve the following methodologies: lecture and interactive discovery-learning and will be offered on the main campus during a three-day academic workshop.

Units of Study. Topics will include:

- 1. The Nature of Witnessing
- 2. The Character of a Witness
- 3. Barriers to Witnessing
- 4. Prayer and Witnessing
- 5. The Holy Spirit and Witnessing
- 6. HeartCall: Women Sharing God's Heart
- 7. Witness Training Resources
- 8. Evangelistic Events

Course Requirements

- 1. Attend class. The course is divided into 8 one-week units. Each week's unit will have a variety of in-class content items, typically consisting of a video lecture and a slide show. Class attendance is based on a self-reported percentage of content completed. The student will provide a written statement of the percentage of completion of all in-class content items, **due Friday**, **July 27**.
- 2. Participate in class discussion. Participation is determined by postings and responses in the Threaded Discussions held each week. These discussions will be related to the material covered in each week's content. All students are required to post a minimum of three responses in the discussion each week: one in answer to the presenting questions, and two in response to classmates' postings. In order for the threaded discussion to be of maximum benefit to everyone involved it is recommended that you stay as close to the course schedule as possible—so that everyone will participate in the discussion in the same week. Late postings will be penalized one point for each day late. Please limit discussions in this venue to the assigned topic. Students may email or use the miscellaneous forum to discuss other topics with your classmates. Graduate students are also required to post at least one posting per week in a graduate only discussion of the Ranier book. **Blackboard closes to students on Friday, July, 27, 2018.**

- Read assigned textbooks and other reading assignments. Reading assignments will include readings from the textbooks, Scripture, and other sources. The student will provide a written statement of completion of all reading assignments, due Friday, July 27.
- 4. Develop an evangelistic event to be used in your women's ministry.

The project report should include the following section headings: Type of Event

Program, Committees Budget, Format Schedule Site Publicity Music Coordination Food Service Child Care Timeline Follow-up

The project report should be ten to fifteen pages, typed, double-spaced following A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses, and Dissertations by Kate Turabian, published by University of Chicago Press. Projects are **due Friday**, July 27.

5. Complete a take home final examination. Final exam will be posted on Blackboard under "Course Documents and will be **due Friday**, **July 27**.
