Course Description

This course is designed to discuss the importance of ministry to preteen and teenage girls, addressing their multidimensional needs in light of cultural, familial, and relational influences. Strategies for promoting and implementing girls' ministry will be explored.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the completion of the course, each student will be able to:

- 1. Understand the importance of ministry to preteen and teenage girls as discussed in class.
- 2. Identify the spiritual, physical, mental, emotional, and relational needs of postmodern teenage girls to be met through the local church as a result of class discussion.
- 3. Study biblical teachings about leadership for girls' enrichment ministry from reading the textbook and Scripture.
- 4. Develop an enrichment program to meet the unique needs of teenage girls in the local church as she completes her Girl's Ministry Project.

Course Requirements

- 1. **Students will attend class**. The course is divided into 8 one-week units. Each week's unit will have a variety of in-class content items, typically consisting of a video lecture and a slide show. Class attendance is based on a self-reported percentage of content completed. The student will provide a written statement of the percentage of completion of all in-class content items, due the last week of class.
- 2. **Students will read the assigned textbook and other reading assignments**. Reading assignments will include readings from the textbook, Scripture, and other sources. The student will provide a written statement of completion of all reading assignments, due the last week of class.
- 3. **Students will participate in class discussion**. Participation is determined by postings and responses in the Threaded Discussions held each week. These discussions will be related to the material covered in each week's content. All students are required to post a minimum of three responses in the main discussion each week: one in answer to the presenting questions and two in response to postings by classmates. In order for the threaded discussion to be of maximum benefit to everyone involved, students must stay as close to the course schedule as possible—so that everyone will participate in the discussion in the same week. Please limit discussions in this venue to the assigned topic. Students may e-mail or use the miscellaneous forum to discuss

other topics with your classmates.

- 4. **Students will complete a Girls' Ministry project.** Propose a Girls' Ministry program for the church. The report should include the following section headings:
 - a. Purpose of Girls' Ministry in the local church
 - b. Format of the Girls' Ministry program
 - c. Leadership development of the program
 - d. Proposed annual calendar (to include organization and implementation of mentoring/discipleship groups as well as special events)
 - * Name each event, purpose of event (with particular attention to what need it will address), description of theme, and brief overview of planning process
 - * Name mentoring/discipleship group(s), purpose of group (with particular attention to what need it will address), target age of group, how long group will meet, what group will study
 - * While planning this calendar, consider placement in total youth ministry plan for church
 - e. Evaluation of Girls' Ministry

The project report should be ten to fifteen pages, typed and double-spaced, following guidelines in *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses, and Dissertations* by Kate Turabian, published by University of Chicago Press and will be due within four weeks after completing the last day of class. Pray that the Lord will give you an opportunity to implement this Bible study with the young girls of your church.

- 5. **Students will research an issue facing teenage girls** and write an eight to ten page paper about a social issue facing teenage girls. See Olson's *Teenage Girls* for issue ideas (excluding Ch. 3 body issues).
- 6. **Students will attend and evaluate an event for teen girls** in a local church OR plan a hypothetical girls' ministry event.
- 7. Students will complete a final examination.

Upload all assignments in Blackboard by the deadline listed in this syllabus. All course requirements must be received by the end of each semester or the student will receive a course grade of an "F." Students may request an incomplete in the course in case of emergency.

Course Evaluation

The course will follow the grading system for the Graduate school.
