

# English Exegesis of James: NTEN5317 New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary Biblical Studies Division Summer 2019 Internet

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#### I. MISSION STATEMENT

An advanced course giving consideration to text-critical, grammatical, syntactical, literary, and historical issues through text analysis in a variety of genres. The course will emphasize sound hermeneutical principles for discovering the meaning of the text and for applying the text in teaching and preaching.

The student learning outcomes of this course include the following:

- 1. Students should understand the state of research related to James
- 2. Students should gain an increased appreciation for the relevance of the exegetical study of James
- 3. Students should acquire the ability to apply their understanding of the historical background and context of James to a sound interpretation of the text

## VII. ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADES:

- 1. You are invited to a Bluejeans meeting in the first week of the class. I cannot require you to attend the Bluejeans Meeting, but I encourage you to try to be there. It will be helpful in getting introduced to the course. In that meeting we will preview the course including the syllabus and the assignments. The meeting will be held on Tuesday night, June 4 at 7:00 pm Central time. If you cannot come at that time, let me know an alternate time, and we will try to take care of all who plan to come.
- 2. Reading Assignment (30%) In each Unit on Blackboard students will have clear reading assignments from the text of James, the Dukes notes, and the two required commentaries for the course. Students will be required to read the above assignments, and the student will complete the following writing assignment for each Unit.(see the syllabus assignment sheet on page 2 of the syllabus or the announcements for each Unit).
- 3. Writing Assignment: (30%) Students will write an exegesis of the assigned biblical texts and will prepare an outline of the communication of the text in a sermon or Bible Study. The Exegesis will be done in the following order:
  - a. Students will begin with a reading of the text assigned in James
  - b. Students will write a brief statement of the meaning of the assigned text as they understand it at this point
  - c. Students will do a verse-by verse explanation of the text using their own understanding of the writer's words before reading the assigned Note and commentary readings on the passages. This process is to enable the student to think through the actual text before hearing what the notes and commentaries say in order to reflect on their own thoughts about the meaning of the text before reading what the commentators say it means
  - d. Students will then read the Dukes notes and the two commentaries, dialoging in brief notes with the writers about differences in the meaning of the text
  - e. Students will then write a summary of the meaning of the text as they process it in the light of the writing from the Dukes Notes and the commentaries
  - f. Finally, the students will prepare a sentence outline communicating the message of the text through a sermon or bible study. The Outline should have an Introduction previewing what will be communicated, at lease two or three main points expressed in complete sentences, at lease two subpoints for each main point expressed in complete sentences, and a brief conclusion showing a call to action based on the text..
- 4. Mid-term Exam (20%). The mid-term exam will be posted by Unit 3. The due date will be midnight on Saturday, June 29 at midnight. Please sent the test by email to <a href="mailto:jdukes@nobts.edu">jdukes@nobts.edu</a>. Detailed instructions will be given on Blackboard in Unit 3 and in the announcements for Unit 3.

5. Final Exam (20%). The final exam will be assigned by Unit 6. The first is completed offline using any resources available to the student. The student can be working on this component all along the way during the second part of the course. The other component is completed online and is a timed, forced completion exam as scheduled in the syllabus. Detailed instructions for both components are given on Blackboard.

**Grading:** will be an average by percentage of all components as indicated.
