

INTRODUCTORY TO GREEK GRAMMAR: NTGK5300 New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary Biblical Studies Division

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The mission of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is to equip leaders to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church.

Purpose of the Course:

The purpose of this course is to introduce the Greek language used in writing the New Testament.

Core Value Focus:

The seminary has five core values: Doctrinal Integrity, Spiritual Vitality, Mission Focus, Characteristic Excellence, and Servant Leadership. This course supports the five core values emphasized by the seminary.

The core value for 2013-2014 is Doctrinal Integrity. Doctrinal Integrity: Knowing that the Bible is the Word of God, we believe it, teach it, proclaim it, and submit to it. Our confessional commitments are outlined in the Articles of Religious Belief and the Baptist Faith and Message 2000.

Curriculum Competencies Addressed:

The Seminary has seven key competencies in its academic program. The key competency addressed in this course is *Biblical exposition*.

Course Description:

This course is designed to teach the elements of Greek grammar to establish a foundational understanding of the language for exegesis of the Greek New Testament. Students who have more than 6 hours of college Greek may not receive credit for this course. Such students should consult with New Testament professors to determine the level at which they should enter the study of Greek in the seminary. Students in the language track are expected to take Intermediate Greek Grammar as their next Greek course. Introductory Greek Grammar is prerequisite for New Testament Greek Exegesis.

Learning Objectives:

The student involved in this course should be able to accomplish the following:

Knowledge

- Know Greek morphology of verb and noun systems and understand the connections between morphology and grammar
- Know Greek vocabulary of words occurring 50 or more times in the New Testament to facilitate reading and use of the Greek New Testament
- Understand Greek grammar principles that lead interpreters to discover the meaning intended by the biblical author

Attitudes

- Appreciate the significance of Greek grammar for translation of the New Testament
- Appreciate the richness of the Greek language for the inspired text
- Recognize the importance of original language study for sound exegesis

Skills

- Utilize basic methods of studying Greek grammar to contribute to teaching and preaching
- Translate selected portions of the Greek New Testament using appropriate translation aids
- Grasp grammatical issues in translation that affect an understanding of the biblical text

Textbooks:

The following texts and resources are required for this course.

Course Teaching Methodology:

- Class sessions will consist of lecture presentations previewing upcoming units of study followed by review of homework exercises of assigned units.
- Class preparation for the students will consist of memorizing assigned vocabulary, reading textbook assignments, and preparing homework exercises.
- Class units presented are: nine units on the Greek substantive system, ten units on the indicative Greek verb, and seven units on the non-indicative Greek verb.
- Course structure will follow a hybrid format.

Assignments and Evaluation Criteria:

- **Vocabulary Homework** will be checked each class. *Greek vocabulary words are to be written out five times each and turned-in every class.*
- Vocabulary Quizzes will taken on blackboard and is due each class session. The list will include the vocabulary words found at the end of each chapter and cover the chapters due for that class session. Each exam will consist of twenty (20) Greek words for which the student

must supply the correct English gloss. The student will need to install the SBL Greek font on their computer to take the vocabulary exams. The font is available on the course files link given below in "Additional Information." Note: A sample vocabulary exam is available for the student to see the format and layout of the vocabulary exams before having to take the first exam. The sample exam also helps to test whether the SBL Greek font is displaying properly on the student's computer. All quizzes are *closed* book.

- Sectional Exams will be taken on blackboard and are due on the dates indicated in the syllabus schedule. These exams focus on the material since the last exam. Learning any language, however, is a cumulative enterprise, so concepts build upon each other. All exams are *closed* book.
- Final Exam is on vocabulary and material since the last sectional exam.
- **Participation** includes the student's in-class participation as well as the student's Discussion Board participation.
- Extra Credit is available and includes read and exercises from Chapters 27 and 28. Three points will be applied to the quiz grade average for the reading of chapter 27 and completion of exercise 27 (pgs. 428–431). Three points also will be applied to the exam grade average for the reading of chapter 28 and completion of exercise 28 (pgs. 438–440).
