Get in SYNC!



In June 2016 the ATS Board of Commissioners approved a three-year experiment allowing an exception to the Commission's PhD residency requirement that "courses, seminars, and colloquia for research doctoral degrees shall normally be completed on the main campus" (Degree Program Standard J, section J.3.1.1). This experiment is limited to offering those courses (roughly two-thirds of the PhD program's total credits) through synchronous interactive video, not through asynchronous means.

Approval of this exception means that beginning in the Fall 2016 semester, students who are unable to take advantage of the campus scholarly environment can participate fully in seminars and colloquia through live Internet connections with students meeting in CIV classrooms.

SYNC delivery requires non-residential students to access the live meetings at the weekly or block times indicated on the PhD course schedule. However, distance students must complete Introduction to Research and Writing, Prospectus Development, Teaching in Higher Education, qualifying exams, oral exams, and dissertation defenses on the main campus.

Dr. Charlie Ray recognizes that SYNC "allows people anywhere in the world to join the classroom here." In addition to extending the PhD program to more students, SYNC can enable the participation of other experts in the field.

With a soft rollout this semester, SYNC delivery currently is available for two seminars and one colloquium, but more courses will enjoy this option in the spring. Watch for SYNC designations on the Spring 2017 schedule in the near future.

no later than one month prior to the meeting at which the prospectus will be considered. See the Program Materials page for the form and details.

A prospectus to be considered by ReDOC must be reviewed by your guidance committee and **9 copies** submitted through your chairperson to the Office of Research Doctoral Programs no later than one week before the scheduled ReDOC meeting. Prospectuses for research involving human subjects must be received one month before the meeting.

Likewise, matters such as directed study proposals and requests to take courses at other institutions must be submitted one week before the ReDOC meeting at which they will be considered.

Also e-mail a **pdf** of the prospectus or directed study proposal to phd@nobts.edu. Do submit a hard copy of the directed study approval page.

Please keep in mind that final approval of your prospectus is granted by your doctoral guidance committee after you make any revisions your committee deems appropriate in light of feedback from ReDOC.

If you are required to go through the Institutional Review Board approval process for research with human subjects, your committee cannot approve your prospectus until the IRB assesses the risk to and protection of the participants.

Newcombe Fellowship: November 15 Deadline

The <u>Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation</u> <u>Fellowships</u> support the final year of dissertation research for PhD candidates in the humanities and social sciences. Proposals should have religious or ethical values as a central concern and be relevant to the solution of contemporary religious, cultural, or human rights questions. The stipend is \$25,000 for a 12-month period of dissertation writing, with the expectation the dissertation will be completed between April 1 and August 31, 2018.

Proposal submission deadline: November 15, 2016, 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time.

EHS Emerging Scholars Grant

In keeping with a commitment to cultivate scholars in the field of homiletics, the Evangelical Homiletics Society has established an Emerging Scholars Grant of \$2,000 plus registration fees and meals to attend the annual EHS conference. The grant competition is open to all PhD students who are Associate Members of EHS (fee: \$25/year).

- To enter, submit a paper of 15,000 to 20,000 words focusing on a relevant issue in homiletics.
- Papers must follow the EHS style guide.
- The EHS jury will evaluate papers based on relevance to the teaching of biblical preaching and the EHS confessional statement.
- The winner will be recognized at the annual conference and may present the research at the conference and/or have the article published in *JEHS*.

Submission deadline: May 31



George Weigel is a Distinguished Senior Fellow of the Ethics and Public Policy Center in Washington, DC, where he holds the William E. Simon Chair in Catholic Studies. As president of the Ethics Center, he led a wide-ranging research program on foreign and domestic policy issues (1989-1996). As a Senior Fellow, he began publishing his major study of Pope John Paul II, which appeared in two volumes: Witness to Hope (Harper, 1999) and The End and the Beginning: Pope John Paul II—The Victory of Freedom, the Last Years, the Legacy (Doubleday, 2010). Mr. Weigel also is the author of The Cube and the Cathedral: Europe, America, and Politics without God (Basic, 2006); Evangelical Catholicism: Deep Reform in the 21st-Century Church (Basic, 2013); and Letters to a Young Catholic (Basic, 2015). He is the Senior Vatican Analyst for NBC News and writes the weekly column "The Catholic Difference," which is syndicated to 60 newspapers.
