



Have you studied towards an MDiv at NOBTS?





When did you begin study at NOBTS?












Hybrid Courses on NOBTS Campus






Extension Center Courses with a Local Professor






In your ministry context, how well do you feel NOBTS prepared you to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church?






Of the courses listed below, identify the 3 courses which have MOST equipped you to fulfill your calling:



Comments:

- A number of the classes in the Worship Ministry specialization greatly benefited my ministry.
- Hermeneutics was a game changer for me, and really laid the interpretive framework that affected the
 rest of my Bible study/teaching. I felt that Church revitalization, honestly hand in hand with Pastoral
 ministry, gave me a deeper love for Christ's church. Ethics and apologetics helped me understand my
 culture and share Christ more effectively.
- The teachers in these classes made a huge difference. Great classes!
- The biblical studies and counseling faculties are doing an incredible job. There is excellence in the other divisions as well but these two are so consistent in giving students their best.

Comments:

- Spiritual Formation was not really necessary as a course. It was something I was already doing.
- I really enjoyed all my classes. Philosophy has never been my favorite subject, but I did learn a lot in the class.
- Although Teaching the Bible and Proclaiming the Bible were two of the classes I thought would be essential and most helpful, I did not have a good experience with either. Many of the other classes I took had very outdated content, some that had not been updated in 10+ years.
- I received something from every course
- I really don't think they didn't prepare me but I checked them off compared to the other classes.
- I enjoyed all of my courses at NOBTS. Each one had something that was helpful! ...the Missions internet course and Encountering Biblical World course put to much information in one course. Should make these more focused in content. The New Testament course, and other courses that discussed the history of the biblical text, used required textbooks that did not encourage me to trust the Bible due to

the liberal biblical textual criticism included in the textbooks. However, all the professors I had at NOBTS honored the Bible. The problem is with some of the required textbooks that do not agree with the Baptist Faith and Message on Scripture.

- I've heard others have had a different experience with encountering the Biblical world, but my course simply consisted of maps and architecture. I didn't feel that it helped me be more effective in Bible study. As someone already in a ministry position, Sup Min 2 felt like a waste of time, especially the textbook on being supervised. Lastly, the Cooperative program class sounds like it has changed somewhat since I started. In my experience, what I had to read was presented far better in Baptist Heritage or other history courses.
- I marked Exploring the Old Testament because that is really too much material to learn in a semester. Would be much better if it was broken up into two or three classes.
- A few of the "practical" courses seemed shallow, redundant, or filled with busywork. They should either be filled out with more thoughtful content or be condensed into fewer courses. More historical and even ecumenical perspectives would have made them more interesting, as some of them seemed tailored to a context of rural Southern churches in the 1990s...
