



#### Have you studied towards an MDiv at NOBTS?








#### How many years have you served in your current ministry role?










#### In your ministry context, how well do you feel NOBTS prepared you to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church?






# Of the courses listed below, identify the 3 courses which have MOST equipped you to fulfill your calling:

#### **Comments:**

- Worship leadership and Encountering the Biblical World were the two most frustrating courses I experienced through NOBTS. This was attributed to a combination of the professor, poor/confusing communication through Blackboard, lack of organization regarding online work, poorly constructed assignments, etc.
- I want to clarify my answer. Church Evangelism has not been a bad experience, but having already taken Supervised Ministry 1 and 2 it seems very redundant. Either take away SM 1 and 2 and place more practicum on CE or take away CE and keep SM 1 and 2. Worship Leadership for me personally did not help further my understanding of leading people in worship, but really of the history behind worship. If that is the intention, great!
- The LEAST section was hard because I feel like all classes I took are needed.
- The LEAST section was hard as all the classes I took are needed.
- Taught by any other professor, I am convinced that Baptist Heritage would have been a good course. Regrettably, it was far from beneficial for me in the classroom. Church Leadership and Administration was a "churched up" Intro to Business course that I took my freshman year of college. It was hardly a master's

level course. The Worship Leadership assignments were overly opinionated and offered little meaningful thought into what worship is. It too heavily leaned on worship style as opposed to worship itself.

- It is hard to say any of these classes did not prepare me for ministry. Overall the least effective class to me personally was Interpersonal Relationship Skills.
- I already took interpersonal in college and am already adept at that. I think it's a good class, but it was the same material for me again. I think Supervised Ministry 1 and Church Evangelism are too redundant. I would substitute one of them for something like death, loss, and grief.
