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## **Mission Statement**

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

# **Course Description**

This course involves a study of the dynamics of communicating the Christian faith interculturally. Attention is given to techniques for understanding culture and worldview, and to the relationship of culture to the gospel, evangelism, discipleship, and other concerns of the Christian faith.

This course addresses all curriculum competencies.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

In order to help prepare servants, the students, by the end of the course, should:

- 1. The student will develop an understanding of culture and worldview by defining these terms.
- 2. The student will appreciate key cultural traits of other cultures.
- 3. The student will demonstrate the ability to describe the worldview of a people group with whom they may be involved in present or future ministry.
- 4. The student will develop a model for communication and sharing the gospel in culturally appropriate ways to people groups in other cultures.

## **Course Teaching Methodology**

A variety of teaching methods will be utilized such as class presentations by the professor using Power Point and handouts. Other teaching methods include small and large group discussion, multi-media presentations, utilization of missions related websites, and other communication mediums. A Canvas shell for the class will be utilized extensively as a resource for students. Students will be expected to be thoroughly prepared for class discussions through readings and the Canvas weekly unit supplements.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

- 1. <u>Course Lectures</u> Each student is expected to attend and participate in all course lectures.
- 2. **Required Reading** Each student is responsible to have completed assigned course texts and/or articles as required according to the course schedule.
  - a. The student will read *Cross-Cultural Connections: Stepping Out and Fitting in Around the World.* A <u>single-spaced report is due, via Canvas, on February 10, 2023 by 11:55pm.</u> The report should include a title page (NOBTS preferred format, see attached example), a bibliographical entry (top of page one), a declarative sentence indicating the percentage of the book that the student read (failure to provide this information will result in a 50% assumption and will be reflected in the grading), a brief summary of the entire book (1 page), an interactive answering of discussion questions, and a concluding paragraph indicating the student's personal evaluation of the book. The major portion of this report will be interactive in focus so first person is acceptable for a majority of the paper. The student will answer one discussion question from each of the twenty-one chapters. At least one paragraph should be written for each of the questions. The chapter title and question should be given before the answer. Example: Chapter 1: Monkeys, Mission and Us Question #2: Have you seen anyone act like the monkey? Have you ever acted like the monkey? What was the result? Answer...

<u>NOTE</u>: Failure to read the entire book will result in a penalty equal to the amount not read. Example: if a student reads 80% of the book, the grade will be lowered by 20 points.

b. The student will read *The 3D Gospel: Ministry in Guilt, Shame, and Fear Cultures*. A single-spaced reflection is due, via Canvas, on March 3, 2023 by 11:55pm. There is no need for a title page. This is a reflection paper. Do include your name, bibliographic information, and a declarative sentence at the top of the paper. After reading the book, there are discussion and reflection questions at the end of the text.

Students will provide brief, clear, and substantive answers to the first discussion question under the heading "Theology (ch3)," <u>and</u> the first two discussion questions under the heading, "Ministry (ch 4)."

<u>NOTE:</u> The same reading % guidelines apply. Also, if you do not have a relevant ministry context, you can substitute question #3 under "Ministry" and one other discussion question from the list.

- 3. Students will be split into 2 groups to present on the text, *Communicating with Grace and Virtue*. Group 1 will teach the class thru chs.1-4 and Group 2 will teach the class thru chs. 4-8. For the group session, a handout should be provided to the class with key teaching points and quotes from each chapter. Additionally, each student should submit a signed reading % and group participation statement. More details to come in class. These class teaching sessions with take place on March 28 and March 30.
- 4. Each student will prepare a <u>3-5 minute</u> video presentation on how to communicate the gospel to another people group or cultural subgroup based upon CCC methods and principles. The student should incorporate at least 2 of the 7 Dimensions of CCC. The student should consider all of the dimensions, but only needs to highlight 2 (or more) for the presentation. It should be a creative presentation. <u>The presentation will be presented</u> in class beginning April 20, 2023.
  - a. In this presentation, feel free to include the following:
    - i. Information on the country, city, people, subgroup, etc. that is helpful in giving context as well as in dealing with the dimensions of ICC.
    - ii. Also address these questions:
      - 1. "What have I learned about intercultural communication?"
      - 2. "What are a few of the biggest lessons God taught me about loving Him and loving neighbor?"
      - 3. "How you will cultivate an ongoing missional lifestyle."
    - iii. Be creative in your video presentations!
- 5. The student will take a final examination via Canvas, which can include questions based upon readings, lectures, and other materials shared in class.

#### **EVALUATION/GRADING:**

Assignments for this course will be evaluated according to the following criteria. However, please refer to the grading rubrics for each assignment, posted on Canvas.

- 1. Does the work illustrate the student's grasp of basic concepts, definitions, and principles related to...?
- 2. Does the student demonstrate clear and specific interaction with the assigned reading material and class discussion?
- 3. Is there evidence of the student's personal reflection on the topics discussed? Does the work illustrate the student's independent research and learning?
- 4. Does the work reflect the student's responsibility to prepare both academically and practically (i.e., has the student attempted to apply the material to his/her ministry setting or to the local church in general)?
- **5.** Does the work fulfill the assignment by the required date? Because ministry itself demands discipline, students are expected to meet established deadlines for submitted work.
- **6.** Is the assignment written at a level appropriate for master's level work? Does the work follow proper style?
