COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to introduce students to the field of Christian counseling and basic counseling skills. Biblically based foundations and approaches to counseling will be examined. In addition, the class will address skill development and application and will examine counseling issues such as marital and family relationship problems, depression, anxiety, anger, forgiveness and reconciliation, substance abuse problems, and spiritual direction.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

In order to perform counseling effectively with the knowledge and skills necessary, students, by the end of the course, should:

- 1. Be able to understand the basic foundations and dimensions of biblically-based Christian counseling, including theological, pastoral, historical, scientific, and psychological elements and counseling models.
- 2. Be able to apply a biblically-based knowledge of pastoral care and counseling to the difficulties commonly faced by church members and their families.
- 3. Be able to evaluate personal limits in counseling and to know how and when to make appropriate referrals.
- 4. Be able to communicate effectively using basic counseling skills.

TEACHING METHODS

This course meets online. Each week you will be asked to interact with different types of materials, including lecture notes, PowerPoint presentations, class texts, exercises or practical activities, and postings on Discussion Board in Blackboard along with responses from other students.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Examinations:

(Midterm—20%, Final—20%)

Exams will cover material from assigned readings and PowerPoint presentations. They will be posted on Blackboard, along with instructions.

Discussion Board:

20%

Students will be required to participate in assigned discussions on Blackboard. Discussion prompts will appear in the course units on Blackboard and will be related to course content or course assignments. Assignments may include brief reports of student perspectives on counseling issues or reports of outside-class activities, like guided personal interactions or counseling interaction verbatims. Each student will be responsible for one primary post in response to *each* of the instructor questions, and a minimum of two secondary post responses per **unit**, commenting on primary posts from other students.

As an example – in Unit 1, you will make a primary post addressing each of the questions (1.1 and 1.2). Then, you will be responsible for commenting on two posts during the week from your fellow students – these are your secondary posts (2 secondary posts for 1.1 and 2 secondary posts for 1.2). **So, in the summer course your total minimum posting for the week is 2 primary posts and 4 secondary posts.** Feel free to make more secondary posts

and to keep the discussion going. In a summer course, each unit equals one week, so you have to do 1.1 and 1.2 in the assigned week. See the Reading and Assignments Schedule below for specific dates. A new discussion board will be posted at the beginning of each unit (on Sunday of each week at 12:00 AM). In order to facilitate better discussion, students must post their primary responses as early as possible in the week, no later than Wednesday, end of day. Discussion boards will be closed on Saturday at 11:59 PM (CST) each week. Discussion board will not be reopened once they are closed.

Posts will be graded for content quality and synthesis of course reading materials. Primary posts must demonstrate an understanding of the reading, presentation, or assigned activity, with a normal expectation of approximately one paragraph in length. Secondary posts may be shorter (a few sentences to a paragraph) but must demonstrate evidence of quality and informed reflection on the subject.

Book Review:

15%

Students will write a book review of not less than five pages, excluding cover sheet, of the book *The Counsel of Heaven on Earth* by Ian F. Jones. The review will be double spaced, in accordance Turabian style. The book review should include (1) a brief summary of content, (2) an evaluation of the strengths and limitations of the work, and (3) its applicability to Christian ministry and counseling (identify the most appropriate audience for the book and whether you would recommend it). See rubric for details. Submit the review on Blackboard.

Research Paper:

25%

Students will write a research essay on a counseling issue of approximately 15 pages in length, not counting cover sheet or bibliography. Please refer to the assignment description in the Blackboard Assignments folder for details and a list of possible research topics. The paper should consist of:

- 1. An introduction to a counseling topic, including definitions, description and extent of the problem, and significant related issues
- 2. An exploration of how the mental health field addresses and/or treats this issue (best practices)
- 3. An exploration of how the Scripture speaks to the issue and how you could integrate Scripture and Christian faith into treatment and ministry
- **4.** A basic plan for how you, as a person in your area of ministry, could address the problem with a counselee and with your larger ministry context (where you minister or plan to minister).

The paper will include a bibliography with a minimum of fourteen (14) references that may include the texts for this course. Possible sources for information include quality books on the subject, counseling texts, academic journal articles, professional organizations dedicated to addressing the problem, Bible commentaries, quality internet articles or sources, etc.—one place to start your search is the syllabus bibliography. Exercise caution in using material found on the internet.

Possible Research Topics: The following topics are generally broad. You may need to narrow the topic in order to cover the material within the requirements of the paper. Students may also choose topics from the chapter headings in the Collins text. The professor must approve other topics.

Each student will write a first draft of the research paper for evaluation by the *NOBTS Writing Center*. While the draft does not need to be a complete paper, be sure to include your cover page, several pages of content, and the beginning of your bibliography so that the center staff can assist you with each section. This draft will be submitted *to the NOBTS Writing Center* by the due date in the course schedule. Students will certify their writing center submission on Blackboard.
