Course Description

This course is designed to augment the student's grasp of Greek grammar as presented in the introductory course and to advance the student's understanding of the exegetical significance of New Testament Greek. Intermediate Greek, while helpful to any student wishing to go further in understanding New Testament Greek, is required for language track students. Intermediate Greek Grammar for Exegesis is perquisite for Advanced Greek Exegesis; Advanced Greek Grammar; Readings in Hellenistic Literature; and Textual Criticism of the Greek New Testament.

Student Learning Outcomes


- 1. The student will understand of the categories and functions of Greek grammar.
- 2. The student will gain increased appreciation for how the study of Greek enhances biblical interpretation.
- 3. The student will acquire the ability to translate Greek New Testament texts and apply this analysis to sound interpretation of the text.

Course Teaching Methodology

The course will involve the following methodologies: listening to lectures, textbook reading, translation and memorization assignments, discussion board participation, and computer resources.

Course Requirements

The following components comprise the student's responsibilities for the course.

- 1. The student will read the required texts for the course.
- 2. The student will read and translate selected biblical passages and locate nouns and verbs.
- 3. The student will take a total of seven vocabulary exams based on the seven vocabulary lists in the Stevens textbook in the appendix, pp. 549–62. For this purpose, a highly recommend iOS app, "NOBTS Vocab," customized to the seven Stevens vocabulary lists is available for vocabulary review on iOS devices at this link below: https://apps.apple.com/us/app/nobts-vocab/id494807674
- 4. The student will take two sectional exams and a final exam.
- 5. The student will participate in threaded discussions in a meaningful way. Various grammatical and exegetical topics will be posted for interaction. One major post is due each week by Tuesday evening and one response post is due by Thursday evening of that same week.

Course Schedule

Getting Started (Pre-Class Activity)

- 1. Welcome. Do the following on Blackboard in the folder Welcome to this Course.
 - a. *Syllabus*. Download and review the syllabus and ask questions if you have any. Questions specific to your context not pertinent to other students can be sent directly by email.
 - b. Preliminary Reading. Within the folder Preliminary Reading, read two documents:
 (1) Please Read First and (2) Tips on Becoming a Great Online Student.
 - c. Introductory videos. Within the folder Welcome Videos, watch Dr. Stevens's Professor Welcome and Course Introduction.
 - d. *Personal Introductions*. Create class cohesion by sharing about yourself on this discussion board.
- 2. Greek. Do the following on Blackboard in the folder Greek Files:
 - a. Download and read Student Help Guide for Posting Greek in Blackboard.
 - b. Download and install the TekniaGreek font. This font is required to take quizzes and exams and participate in the Unit Discussion Board Assignments.
 - c. In the Unicode Greek New Testament Passages for Translation folder, download for future homework activity the New Testament passages for translation. You will be using these files to create your homework PDF translation file for uploading back to Blackboard.
- 3. Theory. Do the following on Blackboard in the folder *Translation Theory*:
 - a. Download and cogitate the content of the PowerPoint file, Bandy-Translation Theory.
 - b. Audition the Bandy-Translation Theory Issues video presentation.
 - c. Post your thoughts on these issues and interact with others on the *Personal Reflections* discussion board.
- 4. **Research**. Research the following four areas on Deissmann, dialects, literary Greek, and non-literary Greek to enhance textbook discussion in chapter 1. Upload a pdf report in the area provided on Blackboard. Show evidence of solid research. Provide a bibliography.
 - a. *Research Adolf Deissmann*. Give a brief biography of his life and work. What books did he write? What was his impact on New Testament study?

- b. *Research ancient Greek dialects*. Focus on Dorian, Ionic, and Attic. Describe their geographic coverage, time frame, and general characteristics.
- c. *Research literary Hellenistic Greek*. What is its general time frame and basic influence? What are its characteristics?
- d. *Research non-literary Hellenistic Greek*. What is its general time frame and basic influence? What are its three main characteristics? Present New Testament examples of elements you discuss.

Requirement details:

- a. Form: 1 inch margins, single-spaced, 12 point font, 3-4 pages, neat, but not formal
- b. Coverage: no less than half a page, no more than a full page, for each area
- c. Citation: use in-text citation, e.g., "(Brooks and Winbery, 245)"
- d. *Bibliography:* 3–4 good, academic resources should be adequate, including commentaries, Bible dictionaries, encyclopedias, etc.; place at the end of the report
- e. Due: Thursday midnight, Week 1
- f. Credit: report serves as extra credit on sectional exams, amount to be determined

Weekly Routine

- 1. **Complete** all the Learning Unit tasks. The general flow is described below.
- 2. **Read** the appropriate chapters in the Stevens textbook and one of the morphology texts. *Exam questions are taken from the exercises at the end of each chapter in the Stevens textbook.* While these exercises are not turned in or graded, *doing them is the equivalent of studying for the exams*, so, greatly in the student's favor. Note that answers to the evennumbered exercises are given in the back of the book to check your work.
- 3. Watch the Stevens Grammar Discussion lecture videos for each unit. (See "Lecture Links" below.)
- 4. **Submit** the provided *Lecture Accountability Report* each week.
- 5. **Translate** and **locate** the appropriate biblical passages. Assignments must be turned in by Saturday 11:59 PM. Click on *Translation Upload* and submit your file.
- 6. **Listen** to the *Warren Translation Discussion* audio for each translation passage. These audio discussions are excellent, providing great insight into the connection between translation and exegesis.
- 7. **Take** the scheduled *Vocabulary Exams* by Thursday 11:59 PM of the week applicable. For this purpose, a highly recommended iOS app, "NOBTS Vocab," customized to the seven Stevens vocabulary lists is available for vocabulary review on iOS devices at this link: <u>https://apps.apple.com/us/app/nobts-vocab/id494807674</u>
- 8. **Take** *Sectional Exams* by Saturday 11:59 PM when applicable. Sectional exams will have a review guide for preparation.
- 9. **Download** and review the *Unit Handouts* when applicable. Unit handouts include exam review guides, grammatical aids, and tools for exegesis.
- 10. **Participate** in the *Unit Discussion Board* (Grammar & Exegesis). Provide at least one post for each of the forums and at least one response to other students in either the Grammar or Exegesis forums. Original posts are due by Tuesday 11:59 PM, and responses are due by Thursday 11:59 PM.
- 11. Participate in the Personal Reflections discussion board when applicable.
