

NTEN/HIST 6340 CHRISTIAN STUDIES IN CONTEXT NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY THEOLOGICAL AND HISTORICAL STUDIES DIVISION FALL 2022 [TURKEY STUDY TOUR]

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I. Mission Statement

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

II. Course Description:

An examination of the biblical, theological, and historical developments of the church giving attention to major individuals, ideas, institutions, movements, and crises. The interaction of Christianity and its cultural, religious, and political environments is addressed. This course is intended to accompany a seminary-led study tour, and its parameters will be set by the context of the tour.

Supplemental Course Description

For this tour of Turkey, the study will include, but not be limited to, New Testament issues found in the Books of Acts, Paul's Letters, and Revelation; and historical issues such as the persecutions under Domitian and Trajan, the establishment of Constantinople as Constantine's capital, the four ecumenical councils, and various early church fathers.

III. Student Learning Outcomes:

By the completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of biblical, theological, and historical developments of the church, which they learned in context
- Apply what they learned from Christian studies in context to their lives and ministries
- Communicate knowledge of biblical, theological, and historical developments of the church clearly and concisely through oral presentations and written assignments.

IV. Required Texts:

There are two required textbooks for this class:

William Tabbernee, Early Christianity in Contexts: An Exploration across Cultures and Continents (Grand Rapids, MI: Baker Academic, 2014).

Wilson, Mark W., *Biblical Turkey: A Guide to the Jewish and Christian Sites of Asia Minor*, 4th Updated and Revised ed. (Ege Yayinlari, 2020).

There will be additional required reading from the Bible and from primary sources that are available on the Internet.

V. Requirements:

A. **Book Summaries**: Each student will write two summaries on selected sections of the two textbooks. Each summary should be between five to six double-spaced typewritten pages in length. Bibliographical information should appear at the top of the first page of the summary. The review also should contain 1) a brief biographical sketch of the author, 2) a brief summary [three to five pages] of the contents of the selected readings, 3) a statement of the book's purpose and the extent to which the purpose was realized, 4) a concluding evaluation. Submit this assignment on Canvas under Assignments.

The summary of *Biblical Turkey* is due on **September 15**, two weeks before departure for the study tour of Turkey. – read all the sections related to tour itinerary. The summary of *Early Christianity in Contexts* is due on **October 31**, three weeks after the return from the study tour of Turkey.

B. **Research Project**: Each student will complete a research project on a historical figure, event, movement, or biblical material connected to Asia Minor. Each written project will be five to six pages long and written according to standard guidelines (Turabian; Times New Roman 12 pt. font; double-spaced; standard margins, etc.) and include a bibliography of at least three resources (biographies or history surveys are preferred, but textbooks, reference books, and the Internet are allowed).

The project is due on **September 22**. Submit this assignment on Canvas on the Discussion Board.

During the trip, each student will present a brief, ten to fifteen-minute summary of the subject of his or her project. The quality of the presentation will be figured into the student's grade for the project.

The subjects of these projects will be chosen by the students or assigned by the professor no later than the beginning of the summer. The subjects include:

- John the Apostle
- Polycarp
- Montanism
- Constantine
- Council of Nicea
- Nicholas of Myra
- Council of Constantinople
- Cappadocian Fathers

- Macrina
- John Chrysostom
- Council of Ephesus
- Council of Chalcedon
- Islam
- Local References to the cities of Revelation

The research project will be evaluated as follows:

- 1. <u>Grammar and style</u>: Spelling, sentence and paragraph development; punctuation; and conformity to the 6th or 7th edition of Turabian.
- 2. <u>Clarity and Coherence</u>: Organization; logical development; overall sense of the paper.
- 3. <u>Research</u>: Bibliography; type and variety of sources (primary, secondary, monographs, journal articles, websites, etc.); most bibliographic entries should be accompanied by footnote citations.
- 4. <u>Historical Awareness and Insight</u>: Factual accuracy; awareness of historical connections (continuity/discontinuity, cause/effect, contrasts/comparisons); sensitivity to historical context; awareness of the historical impact of a person.
- 5. <u>Analysis and Evaluation</u>: Going beyond the mere reporting of facts to include explanation, interpretation, analysis of material; evaluation of strengths and weakness of a person; demonstration that you have thought about the material that you have researched. Give a strong and insightful conclusion.
- C. **Biblical Studies Project:** Journal: Each student will maintain a journal with notes on the sites, pictures, the lectures, and personal impressions. This journal (or a copy) is to be submitted on **October 24**, two weeks after the study tour. Submit a hard copy to one professor, or scan and email it.

D. Summary

- 1. Work before the study tour.
 - a. **Friday, September 15** Summary of *Biblical Turkey*, submit on Canvas under Assignments.
 - b. **Friday, September 22** Research project is due; submit to Canvas under Assignments and on the Discussion Board.
- 2. Study Tour:

Friday, September 29-Saturday, October 8

- a. Maintain your Journal
- b. Presentation of biography
- c. Attend lectures
- 3. Post-Work:
 - a. **Monday, October 24** Journal (or copy) is due. Submit a hard copy to one professor, or scan and email it.
 - b. **Monday, October 31** Summary of *Early Christianity in Contexts*, submit on Canvas under Assignments.

VI. Penalties:

Attendance: Attendance at all class meetings is required, per the Graduate Catalog of NOBTS.

Late Work: A late project assignment will be assessed a 10 percent penalty if it is submitted after the deadline.
