New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

Purpose of the Course

The purpose of this class is to help students develop the knowledge and skills necessary to lead plateaued and declining churches in a variety of settings to become revitalized. This course provides the conceptual tools necessary to understand and work effectively in revitalizing churches by using a case study approach.

Curriculum Competencies Addressed

This course will address the following curriculum competencies:

1. *Biblical exposition:* The student will discover passages of Scripture that will address biblical foundations for leadership in the local church or Christian ministry setting.
2. *Theological and historical perspective:* The course will provide a systematic and historical progression of church leadership and ministry as it has evolved to the requirements today.
3. *Effective servant leadership:* The course is designed not only to teach about servant leadership but also to encourage the student to practice this leadership style.
4. *Interpersonal relationships:* The course contains a strong emphasis on interpersonal skills as a vital aspect of leadership and administration.
5. *Disciple making:* In this course, students are encouraged to understand that the ultimate purpose of leadership is transforming.
6. *Worship leadership:* The course does not directly address worship leadership, however the leadership principles discussed will relate to any venue of ministry in the local church.

Student Learning Outcomes

In order to serve churches effectively through team ministry, the students should:

- Be able to apply their knowledge and comprehension of key issues germane to effective church revitalization.
- Value leadership skills necessary for effective church revitalization.
- Be able to identify possible causes of plateau and decline of a local church in order to develop a strategy for revitalization of the selected local church.

Course Methodology

In coordination with lectures, videos, reading assignments, and in-class discussions, revitalization principles for leaders will be addressed, discussed, and analyzed. Principles representing small, medium, and large churches; churches in rural, small towns, medium-sized cities, and metropolitan areas that have not baptized anyone in years. Students will enhance their skills in leading church revitalization through three closely related ways:

1. Analyzing and developing solutions to different problems churches confront that hinder the revitalization process.
2. Constructing "principles for church revitalization" through biblical standards and research of revitalized churches in a variety of contexts.
3. Developing conceptual tools and frameworks that help make sense of how to revitalize churches.

Course Requirements:

1. Mentorship Hours and Meetings Report **Due each week**

The student will be required to fulfill the requirements of the mentorship, including the minimum of 45 hours working in the ministry setting during the semester. These specified hours do not include the weekly scheduled times for worship and Bible study. The student will meet with the mentor each week to discuss personal and ministry issues and hours worked. The student will submit weekly reports of the mentorship and ministry experiences. The reports should be two paragraphs with one paragraph devoted to the mentorship experiences of the week and one paragraph devoted to the ministry experiences of the week.

2. Biblical Basis Report **Due August 25th @ 11:59pm**

The student will present a 3 to 5 double-spaced page paper establishing a biblical foundation for church revitalization. Utilizing both the Old and New Testaments, the student will also include one biblical character who exemplifies church revitalization with lessons learned from their biblical example.

3. Book Analysis:

Book #2 Due October 20th @ 11:59pm McIntosh, Gary. *There's Hope For Your Church: First Steps to Restoring Health and Growth*. Grand Rapids: Baker Books, 2012.

Each Analysis must include:

- a. a synopsis of major themes of the book,
- b. a critical analysis of strengths and limitations of the book,
- c. and several principles (3-5) the student can derive for church revitalization.
- d. Each review is to be 3-5 pages, double-spaced, employing Turabian.

4. Revitalization Plan Report Due December 6th @ 11:59pm

Each student will develop a Church Revitalization Strategy for a church experiencing plateau or decline. The Strategy must employ insights from all of the required textbooks, presentations, and class discussions. The Church Revitalization Strategy paper should be 10 to 12 pages, double spaced'.

The paper must include:

1. Introduction: This must explain the historical background of the church as extensively as necessary to accurately reflect the church's current state. Historical statistics, leadership structure, programming approaches, and overall culture of the church should be addressed.
2. Guiding Values: Provide an accurate biblical theology for church revitalization that serves as the basis for any efforts to bring revitalization to a local church. Be as comprehensive as possible to address the church, governance, mission, and vision.
3. Strategy: This will be the most comprehensive section (at least 4 pages of the paper) and should provide a clear pathway for your revitalization strategy. Address every aspect that will be involved in the strategy. Determine a reasonable but urgent timeline and provide details that coincide with the timeline.
4. Evaluation: How will you know when you have accomplished the goal? Provide a process of immediate and on-going evaluation. Who? How? When? What tools will you use?
5. Reflection: Based on what you have learned through this project, will you seek to execute this strategy? Explain the opportunities that are open to this strategy or the challenges and how you will overcome them for church revitalization
