Mission Statement

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

Course Description

In this course, students participate in a seminary related mission trip. Students are involved in trip preparation and engage in the mission project while on the field. Students will read and research in areas related to the people they will be working with. Students will reflect on the trip.

Student Learning Outcomes

In order to help fulfill the Great Commission, the students, by the end of the course, should:

- 1. Be able to apply their knowledge and comprehension of mission principles to the work of the mission trip.
- 2. Develop a plan to implement short-term mission trips and partnerships in their ministry context.
- 3. Value strategic concerns affecting the mission trip.
- 4. Be able to accomplish the following:
- a) Participate fully in the mission trip.
- b) Encourage others to be involved in short-term mission trips.

Course Teaching Methodology

The primary teaching methodology of this course is through experiential activities that students will be involved in. They will also gain cultural insight through interaction with other people groups. They will spend time with experienced missionaries during the trip. Students will research the people they will be working with.

• The pages are student choice and can come from a mixture of resources: tour books, websites, mission strategy documents, Google, Wikipedia, News outlets, a tour book, etc. Students will keep a reading journal which will include the number of pages read and insights about the city.

Course Requirements

- 1. ***Required* Team Meeting(s).** Unless otherwise noted, the team meetings will take place in the Global Mission Center along with a virtual option.
- 2. **Reading Assignments.** You are responsible to complete all the required texts/pages by November 10, 2023. However, you are encouraged to read as much as possible before we leave to maximize your understanding of the mission and culture.
 - i. Book Notes and Quotes. Each student will submit a two-three page, singlespaced, document of the two books. The student will highlight main ideas, key points, and key quotes presented by each author. You will be asked to sign a statement verifying that you have read the books, to be included at the top of your two-page paper.

- Electronic Reading Notes. Students must upload their electronic reading notes, including page counts, via Canvas covering the 100 pgs read. The goal of this assignment is for students to learn basic information about the ministry context and the ministry needs. This can be done in bulletpoint format, narrative, etc. Submit on Canvas by Nov. 10
- 3. **Evangelism Verbatims:** These submissions are designed to allow you to describe what you have learned about sharing the gospel and training/equipping within the trip's context. Each student <u>will submit at least 2, one-page, evangelism verbatims</u>. Please conclude each verbatim with a key lesson learned about evangelism or ministry in this

context. These single-spaced verbatims should be a simple narrative of your witnessing experience during the time in Clarkston. Submit these on Canvas bu Oct. 20.

4. Journal. The BEST way to process the trip is by keeping an ongoing journal. You are expected to keep a daily journal during the trip. Additionally, record significant events, insights, etc. as you are preparing for or decompressing from the trip. The intent is not to 'grade' the journal entries, but to form the practice of expectation, thanksgiving, and prayer in your lives. You can use your phone, tablet, or laptop. If you handwrite this journal, please turn it into an electronic version for submission. A copy of this journal is to be submitted via Canvas.

Feel free to use the following questions as thought-fodder:

- What was the most significant thing learned on this trip?
- What would you say to someone preparing to go to the same place?
- How will I communicate this experience to others (family, friends, Christians, non-Christians, etc.)?
- How did my participation in this trip contribute to the advancement of the gospel for someone?
- What, if any, bearing do I feel this trip has had on my understanding of God's call on my life?
- 1. **Participation and Trip Interaction:** You are expected to take an active role in all aspects of this trip (pre, during, and post)—meetings, evangelistic outreach, teaching/training, etc. It is also expected that during the trip you continue to spend a good 30 minutes <u>each morning</u> in prayer and devotional reading. Feel free to include insights or thoughts from these times in your journal.

Course Evaluation and Grading:

Grading will be on a Pass/Fail basis. If you satisfactorily complete all the assignments, you will receive a Pass. However, if you do not satisfactorily complete all the assignments the grade will be Fail.
