

CEAD6355 Leading Family Ministry (NOLA2U Flex) New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary Division of Church Ministry

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The mission of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is to equip leaders to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church.

Purpose of the Course

The purpose of this course is to acquaint students with the programs, resources, and organizational structures to enhance the family life education/ministry of a local church, including work with married couples, parents, and single and senior adults. The course also supports the core value of spiritual vitality as it helps students evaluate how to build spiritual vitality into family systems within the local church through its ministries. The course addresses the curriculum competencies within the area of Christian education and supports interpersonal relationship skills as well by enhancing one's ministerial skills in relating to the family as an integrated system.

Core Value Focus

Doctrinal Integrity – Knowing that the Bible is the Word of God, we believe it, teach it, proclaim it, and submit to it. The doctrinal statements used in our evaluations are our Articles of Religious Belief and the Baptist Faith and Message Statement.

Spiritual Vitality – We are a worshiping community, with both personal spirituality and gathering together as a Seminary for the praise and adoration of God and instruction in His Word.

Mission Focus – We are not here merely to get an education or to give one. We are here to change the world by fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries.

Characteristic Excellence – What we do, we do to the utmost of our abilities and resources as a testimony to the glory of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Servant Leadership – We follow the model of Jesus and exert leadership and influence through the nurture and encouragement of those around us.

Curriculum Competencies Addressed

• The course addresses the curriculum competencies within the area of Christian education and supports interpersonal relationship skills as well by enhancing one's ministerial skills in relating to the family as an integrated system.

<u>Course Description</u>

In this course, the Southern Baptist program of Family Ministry is studied and analyzed. Subjects dealt with include the scope and biblical basis of family ministry, premarital education, and education for family living, including marriage enrichment and parent education. The relationships of family ministry to the total educational programs of churches are studied, methods are discussed, and resources are identified

The student involved in this course should be able to accomplish the following:

- Identify and discuss family ministry from biblical, historical, demographic, and developmental perspectives.
- Value specific components of family ministry in the local church setting.
- Utilize administrative procedures in implementing a family ministry in the local church.

Teaching Method.

This course will utilize lecture, group presentations, and an interactive discovery-learning format

Assignments and Evaluation Criteria

Class Participation & Attendance—5%

The class will seek to engage the experiences and questions of the class. Times of question-and-answer as well as small group work will provide opportunities to dialogue through the course content. Students are expected to be prepared to give substantial and supportive comment to the course and the overall teaching-learning experience. Therefore, regular class attendance and participation is needed. Students taking the course in a NOLA2U Flex format must meet the class attendance requirements and are encouraged to dialogue with the professor on topics via Blackboard, email, virtual meetings, or phone, but are not required to do so.

Biblical Rationale of Family Ministry Paper-25%

Create an 8-page research paper communicating the biblical foundation for family ministry. Present and explain, from various Old and New Testament passages, the biblical presentation of family as designed by God. Employ commentaries, our course readings, journal articles as sources for your biblical rationale. Use Turabian format following seminary guidelines.

Family Ministry Newsletter Articles—20%

- Select three current issues that families face and produce an insightful but brief newsletter article grappling with the topic.
- You may choose as the audience for your article: children (of reading age), teens, parents, grandparents, young singles, or any other age group. Be sure to indicate the target audience of each article.
- Each article must be between 3000-4500 characters. Points will be deducted for articles under or above this range.
- Each article should conclude with a recommended resource for further reading.
- The tone of the article may be formal or informal, depending on your preference for your intended audience.
- Keep in mind the families in your church context when selecting these issues.
- Reference the Bible and/or course texts and journal articles in your articles using parenthetical references. For example (Deut. 6:6-9) or (Ron Hunter Jr., *Recalibrate*)
- The assignment will not use Turabian format

New Church Member Packet for Families —25%

The purpose of this project is to organize your church's ministry to families in a way that is understandable and appealing to new members. You may create the packet for your existing church unless such a packet already exists. Whether using a real or fictitious church setting, be sure to include:

- A theme, mission statement, or otherwise central concept driving the ministry
- Information about the church (brief history, current staff and volunteer positions)
- A brief overview of God's plan for families (summarize your Biblical Rationale paper)
- An overview of your church's ministry to families
- Available small group options and how these fit into the ministry to the family
- Resources for at least 3 month's worth of family devotions (either existing literature or literature you create)
- A calendar of events which would serve a family well
- Any additional resources you feel would help new families assimilate into the life of your church

Staff Development Retreat Presentation – 25%

Prepare a 15 minute presentation on a topic relevant to family ministry. The target audience for your presentation will be fellow staff members at your church (either real or fictitious). Choose either a new topic or a topic which has been covered in class but from a previously uncovered perspective. Prepare to deliver the presentation to the class.
