Mission Statement

Core Value Focus

Curriculum Competencies

All graduates of NOBTS are expected to have at least a minimum level of competency in each of the following areas: Biblical Exposition, Christian Theological Heritage, Disciple Making, Interpersonal Skills, Servant Leadership, Spiritual and Character Formation, and Worship Leadership. The curriculum competencies addressed in this course are: Disciple Making, Interpersonal Skills, and Servant Leadership.

Course Description

This course is designed to identify the needs and gifts of women today in order to build a more effective women's ministry in the local church. Students will explore the biblical foundations and various models of women's ministry. In addition, students will examine all components of a comprehensive women's ministry program.

Student Learning Outcomes

At the conclusion of the semester, the student will:

- 1. Understand the biblical teachings about the roles of women in the church.
- 2. Be aware of strategies to build women's work in the local church.
- 3. Recognize the needs of women to be met through the church.
- 4. Identify the spiritual gifts of women to be used in ministry.

- 5. Implement various programs for women in the local church.
- 6. Develop a purpose statement to guide your ministry.

Course Requirements

- 1. **Attend class**. This course is divided into 8 one-week units. Each week's unit will typically consist of a slide show and video lecture. The student will provide a written statement of the percentage of completion of all in-class content items. This assignment is due March 12, 2021.
- 2. Participate in class discussion. Participation is determined by postings and responses in the Threaded Discussions held each week. These discussions will be related to the material covered in each week's content. All students are required to post a minimum of three responses in the main discussion each week: one in answer to the presenting questions, and two in response to classmates' postings. In order for the threaded discussion to be of maximum benefit to everyone involved, it is recommended that you stay as close to the course schedule as possible and post your initial response by Wednesday of each week. All responses are due by Sunday evening at 11:59pm of each week. New units will begin on Monday. Late postings will be penalized 1/2 point for each day late. Please note the course will close on Blackboard on Friday March 12.
- 3. Read the assigned textbook and other reading assignments. Reading assignments will include readings from the textbooks, Scripture, and other sources. The student will provide a written statement of completion of all reading assignments, due March 12, 2021.
- 4. Write a critical review of *Word-Filled Women's Ministry*, due Friday, March 12, 2021. The review should be 5-7 pages (typed, double-spaced), following the *NOBTS Manual of Form and Style*. The book review should include the following sections:
 - Bibliographical Information
 - Purpose of the Book (1 pg)
 - Organization and Content (1pg)
 - Evaluation (3-5 pgs)

- Accomplishment of purpose
- Strengths
- Weaknesses
- Usefulness for ministry to women
- 5. Conduct two interviews with leaders of women's ministries (one local church or denominational paid staff member and one local church volunteer layperson if possible). Submit a 4-5 page typed summary of the findings from the interviews which should include but are not limited to: (1) the leader's philosophy of ministry; (2) hints/guidelines this leader uses in program planning; (3) ways this leader develops leaders within her ministry; and (4) the 'take-away' or highlight of the interview. The format for the assignment should follow the *NOBTS Manual of Form and Style*. This assignment is due Friday, March 12, 2021.
- 6. **Develop a Purpose Statement** for strategic, intentional ministry to women in your local church. Reflect on course readings, examine 2-3 purpose statements from other ministries, and conduct research to inform the work. The submitted assignment should cite at least one of the required readings and two additional, outside sources. Both sources should be academic and only one may be an online source. Include your personal calling to ministry, ministry philosophy, and their connection to your church's mission statement. The paper should be 6-8 pages in length (typed, double-spaced) following the *NOBTS Manual of Form and Style*. **This assignment is due Friday, March 12, 2021.**
