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I. MISSION STATEMENT

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim his truth, and fulfill his mission.

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is a thorough study of Romans through verse-by-verse and paragraph-byparagraph analysis, comparison of various English versions, consideration of pertinent historical and cultural issues, and consultation with major literature and commentaries. The course emphasizes proper methods for discovering the meaning of a text and applying it in teaching and preaching. Prerequisites: BSHM5310 Introduction to Biblical Hermeneutics and NTEN5300 Exploring the New Testament. Dr. Stevens's video course description is here:

III. STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Knowledge

Students who complete this course successfully should:

- Know the general historical, political, social, and cultural background to the letter of Romans in its first-century context
- Know the major hermeneutical and exegetical issues in the critical study of Romans as these issues impact an interpretation of the letter
- Know the structural outline of the letter of Romans as presented in class in order to contextualize passages within the letter

Attitudes

Students who complete this course successfully should:

- Appreciate the richness of Romans for Christian doctrine over the centuries, especially as codified in the crucial passages throughout the document
- Recognize the importance of original language for sound exegesis and application of a biblical text
- Be more confident in interpreting Romans in the context of teaching and preaching in the local church

Skills

Students who complete this course successfully should be able to:

• Produce a bible study or sermon outline based upon a passage in Romans that builds on historical exegesis and demonstrates practical application.

- Provide critical commentary of any section of Romans demonstrating interaction with the text, an understanding of class lecture, and of commentary reading
- Articulate a biographical outline of Paul's life and mission using Acts as a basis that situates Romans within this framework

VIII. TEACHING METHODLOGY:

- Class sessions will consist of presentations overviewing units of study followed by general discussion. Students will lead in panel discussions as assigned.
- Class preparation will consist of textbook readings according to the syllabus schedule, book reports, panel discussions, and exams.
- Class units presented are: three units on Paul's life, mission, and message, three units on historical setting, integrity, and outline of Romans, and eighteen units on exegesis of the text of Romans.

IX. COURSE EVALUATION:

- Blackboard Uploads. All written work will be uploaded to the Blackboard shell.
- Extra Credit can be earned applied to a sectional exam grade by reading and giving a half page, single-spaced summary/response to the following two chapters:
 - ---Stevens: 2:13-44 ("The Righteousness of God"), 3 pts.
 - ---Stevens: 3:45-86 ("The Rhetoric of Romans 7"), 4 pts.
- Session Responses for assignments in the first week of class. Provide a 1-page, single-spaced interaction for each session, including personal response, new insights. These two session responses will be counted as the weekly quiz.
- Weekly Quiz on the assigned syllabus readings from the Stevens and Moo textbooks, with the lowest dropped up to the maximum number of cuts for the class. The weekly quiz has no makeup. The quizzes are taken in the Blackboard shell online. *Quizzes are due by* 11:59 pm *the day before class*.

- Sectional Exams will be given on the days scheduled. These exams focus on the class lecture and reading assignments since the last exam. The final exam is simply the third sectional exam.
- **Panel Discussion** is small-group leadership of the class through *presentation* and *discussion*. The presentation should summarize concisely the key issues of the assigned topic or passage. After the brief presentation to overview the topic, the small group is responsible for leading class discussion of the topic.
- **Book Reviews** will be submitted. The reviews should be 1–1.5 pages, single-spaced, 12-point Times, one-inch margins. Provide a bibliography entry for the book, a brief description of the author, content summary, and evaluation/observations.
- **Term Paper** will be based upon a passage in Romans chosen by the student and approved by the professor. The paper should be Turabian style, 14–15 double-spaced pages for chapters, plus preliminaries (title, blank, contents) and a bibliography of a minimum of 12 modern, critical, academic resources. A penalty of 5 points/day will be assessed for late papers.

The paper's required outline is given in detail below:

Introduction—build interest; indicate the purpose for the paper, the general nature of the passage being studied, and the exegetical promise of the passage

Chapter 1: Text and Historical Background

- (1) *Text*—provide your translation with verse numbers and paragraph divisions. Briefly summarize any debated structure or divisions, if applicable.
- (2) *Word Study*—if the passage has theologically significant words, do word-study research on a chosen word; then, *summarize* the research in the paper and conclude, noting issues of meaning and interpretation the word study surfaces.
- (3) *Historical Background*—determine topics of historical background pertinent to the specific book and author and the particular passage being studied, such as slavery in the first-century world, the use of house churches, the history of Jews in Rome, the reign of emperor Nero, Jewish Diaspora in Spain, adoption in the Greco-Roman world, Paul's third missionary journey, etc. Include a *summary of* one topic that significantly assists exegesis of your passage.

Chapter 2: Exegetical Analysis

- (1) *Literary Context*—indicate the *external structure*, that is, the *literary* context in terms of *placement* of the passage in the *outline* of the letter.
- (2) *Literary Analysis*—indicate the *internal structure* of the logic and argument of the passage and an exceptical outline; provide a verse-by-verse critical commentary of the passage.
- (3) *Central Theme*—conclude by stating the central theme or point of the passage in one concise sentence as supported by the exegetical analysis. Expand on the idea; indicate a central biblical truth supported by the passage to guide teaching and preaching.

Chapter 3: Practical Application

- (1) *Title*—give a title for the application that either invokes a key idea or teases the audience with an interesting angle
- (2) *Truth*—the central bible truth or Christian living key to come from studying or preaching this passage, derived directly from the theme indicated above
- (3) *Objective*—a clear, concise, short statement of a.) desired lesson or sermon outcome and b.) appropriate audience response

- (4) *Outline*—not necessarily the same as the exceptical outline above (which follows grammar and logic flow), this outline is based upon the exceptical work but is developed *topically* or *logically* for teaching or preaching the passage effectively in church settings.
- (5) *Development*—if a bible study, this would include your opening attention getter or illustration or activity, and a fleshing out of the outline with points and appropriate illustrations; if a sermon, this would be your opening attention getter or audience rapport device, and a fleshing out of your sermon outline with points and appropriate illustrations.
- (6) *Conclusion*—if a Bible study, this would include your final illustration, activity, or teaching aid that reinforces the focal truth; if a sermon, this would be your specific conclusion and challenge for response (illustration, story, etc.)
