Course Description

This course is designed to teach the elements of Greek grammar to establish a foundational understanding of the language for exegesis of the Greek New Testament.

Student Learning Outcomes

The student outcomes for this course include the following:

1. Students should understand the categories and functions of Greek grammar
2. Students should gain an increased appreciation for how the study of Greek enhances Biblical interpretation
3. Students should acquire the ability to translate some texts in the Greek New Testament and apply this analysis to sound interpretation of the text

Course Teaching Methodology

The course will involve the following methodologies: lecture videos, student assignments, textbook reading, memorization, and recitation. Both inductive and deductive approaches to learning Greek grammar will be utilized.

Course Requirements

1. **Daily Assignments:** Each unit is divided into 5 lessons. These lessons include a range of daily assignments designed to help you learn and retain Greek grammar and vocabulary. These assignments include exercises such as writing Greek paradigms, reciting vocabulary words, and reading the textbook. Students are strongly encouraged to do 1 lesson each day of the week instead of trying to do multiple lessons in one day. These daily assignments will account for 25% of the grade for the course.

2. **Class Participation:** This course will also feature a number of ungraded assignments such as vocabulary practice, translation practice, and discussion board participation. While students will not be assessed a specific grade for each of these assignments, the student will be assessed based on his or participation in and completion of these assignments. Class participation accounts for 10% of the final grade for this course.
3. **Vocabulary Quizzes:** Beginning in Unit 3, Lesson 4 of each unit will include a vocabulary quiz on words covered in prior lessons. These vocabulary quizzes account for 15% of the grade for the course.
4. **Review Quizzes:** Beginning in Unit 3, Lesson 5 will include a review quiz on various Greek concepts covered in prior lessons. These review quizzes account for 15% of the grade for the course.
5. **Assessments:** Beginning in Unit 3, each unit will begin with an assessment that covers any concepts covered in prior units. This assessment will be the first assignment of the new unit. These assessments account for 25% of the grade for the course.
6. **Final Exam:** Students will take a cumulative final exam at the end of the semester. This final exam accounts for 10% of the grade for the course.

Evaluation of Grade

The student's grade will be computed as follows:

- Class Participation (10%)
- Vocabulary Quizzes (15%)
- Review Quizzes (15%)
- Assessments (25%)
- Final Exam (10%)
