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#### **Mission Statement**

## **Course Description**

This course is designed to explore in detail issues associated with women's ministry in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Attention will be given to current trends, leadership concerns, and other items related to women's ministry as a profession.

#### **Student Learning Outcomes**

By the end of this course, each student will be able to:

- 1. Evaluate current cultural perspectives in ministry to women.
- 2. Explore needs of women and discuss ministry opportunities to meet these needs in the church and beyond.
- 3. Analyze current issues pertinent to women that ministries to women can address.

## **Course Teaching Methodology**

The course will include textbook readings, slideshow presentations, and interactive discovery. Students will engage in personal research, presentations, and class discussions. It will be offered on the main campus as a secondary course to Foundations in Ministry to Women.

## **Course Requirements**

#### **Reading Contract/Class Participation**

The student is expected to complete the ongoing reading assignments in preparation for each class day, and then submit a signed statement at the end of the course, indicating what percentage of the textbooks you have read. **Due: May 5** 

## On Campus Class Participation:

Classroom participation is determined by attendance, completion of all reading assignments prior to the scheduled class time, and active participation in classroom discussions and activities.

## Flex Participation:

If you are taking this course as a NOLA2U Flex student, please note the following attendance policies:

- You are required to be in class either through viewing the lectures live or viewing the recorded lectures on Canvas. When you view the recorded lecture, you will be considered present for that class. Regardless of if you watch the class live or recorded, you are only allowed to miss the amount of class time specified in the NOBTS attendance policy as stated in this syllabus.
- You will be asked to certify that you have been present for the live session or have viewed the recorded session. This certification will be done through Dr. Emily Dean after having watched the class live or viewing the recorded session.
- 3. All video lectures are available for 7 days after the video is posted. If you are unable to view the video within that time frame, you will be considered absent for that class session.
- 4. Technical issues will not be considered a valid reason for missing a lecture.

#### **Journal Articles**

Compile an electronic notebook of 10 journal articles dealing with women's issues. Ideally, these articles will be related to your research topic for the semester. Articles should come from professional journals dated no earlier than January 2010, and the subjects of the research should be primarily females. This notebook should reflect the stages/seasons/transitions/issues faced throughout a woman's life from birth to death (as applicable to your research topic). Highlight the following within each article:

- The purpose of the research
- Other studies cited in the article

- Results of the study; statistical information presented
- The importance of what the authors did/did not find

Students will submit a 2-3 paragraph summary of each article detailing implications of this study for leaders of ministry to women in the local church. **Due March 7** 

## **Contemporary Issue Research Paper**

Students will research one contemporary challenge or issue related to women or ministry to women and present on the issue to the class. The topic can be of any subject related to women's issues, nationally or internationally, such as mental health issues, sex trafficking, abortion, gender identity, violence against women, etc. Students will submit an 8-to-10 page (content), double-spaced research paper on the issue including footnotes and bibliography reflecting research sources per the NOBTS Manual of Form and Style. **Due April 11** 

### **Contemporary Issue Presentation**

To accompany the research paper, students will create a slideshow and presentation (5-10 minutes) to present to the class. On campus students will present in class. Flex students who join the class live may also present their research live. Students viewing the video later will submit the slideshow along with video to present the information. Creativity is welcome. **Due April 11** 

## **Relational Experience Journal**

"As you are going..." You are asked to journal on a weekly basis about at least one encounter with another female to get in the habit of recognizing ministry opportunities in unlikely places such as local coffee shops, restaurants, gyms, and so on. Each journal entry should include the setting of the encounter, whether it was planned or spontaneous, the basic focus of the conversation as well as other miscellaneous thoughts. Particular attention should be given to the discovery of the real needs, concerns, and issues of these women's lives. You should spend time praying before, during, and after these encounters. At the end of the course, a 4-to-6 page, double-spaced paper will be submitted electronically, summarizing the highlights and lowlights of the journal entries as well as including a section on ministry insights and implications gleaned from the experience. **Due May 5**
