COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to teach the basic elements of Greek grammar to establish a foundational understanding of the language for exegesis of the Greek New Testament. This course is a prerequisite for NTGK5352 Greek 2 where students will complete their study of Greek grammar. Students with 6 hours of college Greek may be eligible to forego taking this course. Such students should consult with New Testament professors to determine the level at which they should enter the study of Greek in the seminary.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of the semester the student will:

- Be familiar with the grammatical concepts related to the Greek noun and finite verb systems
- Understand the importance of accurate translation for biblical interpretation and teaching/preaching
- Demonstrate proficiency in Greek translation by completing out of class translation exercises and participating in in-class activities
- Recognize the importance of proper biblical interpretation in carrying out the Great Commission

Students may earn partial credit for words missed on a vocabulary quiz by writing the word ten times by hand in Greek and English and turning in the words by the next class meeting.
- 2. Students will be graded on their participation in class and their ability to interact with the material studied.
- 3. A grade will also be given a grade for daily translation work, as well as other written work sheets that will be assigned on Canvas.
- 4. Two tests will be given. Both tests will cover grammar, translation, and parsing. Each test will be available on Canvas each Friday at 1:00 PM, and the completed tests should be posted to Canvas no later than the following Monday at 1:00 PM.
