COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to augment the student's grasp of Greek grammar as presented in the introductory course. This course will focus on grammar, translation, and the exegetical significance of New Testament Greek. Greek 2, while helpful to any student wishing to go further in understanding New Testament Greek, is required for language track students. Greek 2 is a prerequisite for Greek Exegesis courses; Advanced Greek for Exegesis; Readings in Hellenistic Literature; and Textual Criticism of the Greek New Testament. Prerequisite: NTGK5351 Greek 1 or its equivalent.

Student Learning Outcomes

The student outcomes for this course include the following:

- 1. Students should understand the categories and functions of Greek grammar
- 2. Students should gain an increased appreciation for how the study of Greek enhances Biblical interpretation
- 3. Students should acquire the ability to translate most any text in the Greek New Testament and apply this analysis to sound interpretation of the text

Course Requirements

- 1. Daily quizzes will be given over the course of the semester and will come from the appropriate chapters in Mounce's grammar. Quizzes will come from the vocabulary and grammar for the assigned chapters. Students may earn partial credit for words missed on a vocabulary quiz by writing the word ten times and turning in the words by the next class meeting.
- 2. Students will be graded on their participation in class and their ability to interact with the material studied.
- **3.** A grade will also be given for daily translation work, as well as other written work sheets that will be assigned occasionally. Full credit can only be received for work that is turned in on time; however, partial credit will be given for any written assignment that is turned in late.
- **4.** Two tests will be given. Both tests will cover grammar and translation. The two tests will be take-home; they will be available on Canvas each Friday at 1:00 PM, and the completed tests should be posted to Canvas no later than the following Monday at 1:00 PM.

Students are expected to attend and participate in the class sessions. Because of the nature of the intensive, students who miss any portion of the class may receive a grade of "F" for the course.
