COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces the content and major interpretive issues of the OT books of Job–Malchi. This course introduces the content and major interpretive issues of Job–Malachi. The course covers literary, historical, and theological contexts as well hermeneutical principles related to reading the OT genres of wisdom, poetry, and prophecy. This course complements OTEN5351 OT Interpretation I: Genesis–Esther.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the conclusion of the semester, the student will:

- Recognize the key issues in the critical study of the OT books of Job–Malachi.
- Recognize the purpose and message of the OT books of Job–Malachi.
- Understand the significance of Old Testament as Christian Scripture.
- Utilize key hermeneutical principles to interpret OT genres of Prophecy, Poetry, and Wisdom.
- Develop an appreciation for and enjoyment of the Old Testament.

COURSE TEXTS

COURSE TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The course will involve the following methodologies:

The primary method of instruction for this course will be lecture and guided analysis of the Old Testament. Students will also learn through reading, discussion, and research assignments which they will complete as required components of the course.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Weekly Quizzes (30%) Weekly Quizzes cover material from the lecture/notes/powerpoints as well as the reading for the week. Students should set aside 45 minutes to take the weekly quiz.
- 2. Critical Thinking Forum Posts (10%) There are Critical Thinking Forums throughout the course. Each forum post requires critical engagement with a discussion prompt. Students must provide a post of at least 500 words that addresses the forum prompt. Avoid using language like "I think, I feel, etc." Give direct answers to the prompt. While you are not required to respond to your peers, you are free to do so by informing them in a polite manner what questions you have about their post, additional thoughts you may add to their observations, or what qualities of their post you found particularly engaging
- 3. OT Chats (10%) On the five dates listed below, students will participate in a 30 minute "Chat" with the professor and other members of the course. Students who are able to participate live in the discussion receive full credit based on their attendance. Students who cannot attend the conversation must write a 200 word summary of the conversation and submit it via Canvas by the due date for the weekly assignments to receive credit.

- 4. Sermon/Teaching Outline (10%) Each student will complete a comprehensive teaching/sermon outline on an assigned passage from an OT book. Passages will be assigned by the professor by the tenth week of the course. Students will use the Sermon/Teaching Outline template provided in Canvas.
- 5. Worksheets (40%) Students will complete 4 worksheets which cover material relevant to the Old Testament. Worksheets are guided research that will require students to engage particular questions using specific sources and methodologies. Worksheets are to be 3-4 pages (Single Spaced) in length. Worksheets must be submitted on Canvas by the dates given in the Course Outline below.

The student's grade will be computed as follows:

10% - OT Chats

10% - Outline

40% - Worksheets
