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Mission Statement

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

Course Description

This course compares a biblical and Christian understanding of the doctrine of revelation and the Bible with Islamic teaching. The course will explore Muslim views about the Bible and Qur'an and the role of prophets and messengers. The relationship between general and special revelation in the Islamic worldview as well as human ability to perceive and respond to God will be discussed. The theoretical aspects of these issues will be balanced with the challenge to communicate a witness of Jesus Christ as Lord with persons absorbed in the Islamic worldview.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will:

- Develop a love and respect for Muslim peoples and their cultures.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the origins of Islam as a tradition that emerges in conversation with biblical topics and theology.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the primary sources of authority for Muslims (e.g., the Qur'an, hadith, etc.).
- Be familiar with Muslim views of divine revelation as well as the philosophical and theological background of those views.
- Demonstrate knowledge of Muslim arguments against veracity of the Bible as divine revelation and Christian responses to those arguments.

Course Requirements

- A. **PARTICIPATION** (10%): Active participation in discussions, in-class readings, etc., is expected and absences will negatively impact your participation grade (you cannot participate if you are not present). At the discretion of the professor, a participation grade **under 80%** will result in a letter grade reduction; **74% or lower** will result in an "F" for the course.
- B. **READING QUIZZES** (20%): During the designated weeks, five quizzes be administered to determine the student's comprehension and mastery of the **Reynolds and Qureshi books** (see the schedule below). The quizzes are **open book**, but they are timed. The quiz is due at **midnight** before the following class period.
- C. CHAPTER/ARTICLE REFLECTIVE SUMMARIES (20%): During the designated weeks, students are to read the assigned chapter/article provided by the professor on Canvas. Students will then submit a **1 page, single-spaced reflective summary** with your name at the top and the chapter/article title you're summarizing. Each of the following elements should be found in the summary, clearly delineated by titles: (1) Description and Summary of Key Ideas/Findings; (2) Positives and Negatives; (3) Implications and/or Applications.
- D. QUR'AN JOURNAL (20%): During the designated weeks, students are to read the assigned portions from Nickel's Qur'an and summarize key findings in a journal (i.e., a Word document). Students should record key themes, teachings, theological topics, descriptions of God, comparisons/contrasts with the Bible, etc. Each reading, date, etc. should be clearly identified in the journal. For each week's reading, students should record 700-1000 words (2-3 double-spaced pages) of reflections. The Qur'an Journal is to be uploaded to Canvas in PDF format by midnight, May 9.
- E. **RESEARCH PAPER** (30%): Students are to select one biblical/qur'anic personality/prophet (e.g., David, Abraham, Moses, Joseph, Noah, Jesus, etc.) to research write an 15-20 page, double-spaced research paper. Emphasis should be on the role this personality/prophet plays in the Qur'an's/Islam's salvation-historical narrative as compared with the role of that person in the Bible's salvation-historical narrative. Below is a suggested breakdown of the paper, though students are free to use their own titles, subtitles, etc. as they prefer (a grading rubric can be found in Canvas):
 - Introduction
 - Qur'anic/Islamic Depiction of "_____"
 - Literary Comparison and Contrast with the Biblical Portrait
 - Theological Analysis/Implications
 - Conclusion

The paper should be well researched, well written, clearly documented with footnotes, and done in accordance with **Turabian/NOBTS guidelines** (title page, footnotes, bibliography, etc.). Students should use primary sources (e.g., Qur'an, Hadith, Bible) as well as secondary literature (at least 7 secondary sources). A **first draft** is due by **midnight**, **April 3.** Students should be prepared to **present a synopsis of their findings** on **May 2 in class** (**online – a recording must be submitted one week prior if you won't be online during class). The final paper** is to be **uploaded to Canvas in PDF format** by **midnight**, **May 9.**

Evaluation of Grade

<u>Grades</u> will be determined on the basis of the NOBTS grading scale—an A for 93-100, B for 85-92, C for 77-84, D for 70-76, and F for 69 or below.
