MISSION STATEMENT OF THE COUNSELING PROGRAM

The mission of the NOBTS Counseling Program is to provide training and supervised experience in evidence-based counseling methods to help people deal with life issues in a biblically sound way and prepare students for licensure in counseling and counseling-related professions. We seek to produce graduates who have the values, knowledge, skills, and personal disposition to promote the mental health and holistic wellness of clients across diverse populations.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to introduce students to the field of Christian counseling and basic counseling skills. Biblically-based foundations and approaches to counseling will be examined. In addition, the class will address skill development and application and will examine counseling issues such as marital and family relationship problems, depression, anxiety, anger, forgiveness and reconciliation, substance abuse problems, and spiritual direction.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

In order to perform counseling effectively with the knowledge and skills necessary, students, by the end of the course, should:

- 1. Be able to understand the basic foundations and dimensions of biblically-based Christian counseling, including theological, pastoral, historical, scientific, and psychological elements and counseling models.
- 2. Be able to apply a biblically-based knowledge of pastoral care and counseling to the difficulties commonly faced by church members and their families.
- 3. Be able to evaluate personal limits in counseling and to know how and when to make appropriate referrals.
- 4. Be able to communicate effectively using basic counseling skills.

TEACHING METHODS

This course meets twice per week in a live classroom experience. Each week you will be asked to interact with different types of materials, including lecture notes, PowerPoint presentations, class texts, videos, exercises or practical activities, and responses from other students.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Examinations: Midterm—20% Final—20%

Exams will cover material from assigned readings and PowerPoint presentations. They will be posted on Blackboard, along with instructions.

Resource Guide: 20%

Students will submit a resource guide for their own ministry context or anticipated ministry context. The guide must include local mental health referral resources and quality online resources. See the assignment description in Blackboard for details.

Book Review: 15%

Students will write a book review of not less than five pages, excluding cover sheet, of the book *The Counsel of Heaven on Earth* by Ian F. Jones. The review will be double spaced, in accordance Turabian style. The book review should include (1) a brief summary of content, (2) an evaluation of the strengths and limitations of the work, and (3) its applicability to Christian ministry and counseling. Submit the review on Blackboard at the designated place under Assignments.

Research Paper: 25%

Students will write a research essay on a counseling issue of approximately 15 pages in length, not counting cover sheet or bibliography. Please refer to the assignment description in the Blackboard Assignments folder for details and a list of possible research topics. The paper should consist of:

- 1. An introduction to a counseling topic, including definitions, description and extent of the problem, and significant related issues
- 2. An exploration of the mental health field addresses and/or treats this issue (best practices)
- 3. An exploration of how the Scripture speaks to the issue and how you could integrate Scripture and Christian faith into treatment and ministry
- 4. A basic plan for how you, as a person in your area of ministry, could address the problem with a counselee and with your larger ministry context (where you minister or plan to minister). See assignment folder for details and helps.

The paper will include a bibliography with a minimum of fourteen (14) references that may include the texts for this course. See assignment description in Blackboard for specific requirements. Possible sources for information include quality books on the subject, counseling texts, academic journal articles, professional organizations dedicated to addressing the problem, Bible commentaries, internet articles or sources, etc.—one place to start your search is the syllabus bibliography.

Papers will be scanned for plagiarism. (See the seminary statement in the Student Handbook under General Policies [p. 9] at http://www.nobts.edu/resources/pdf/StudentHandbook.pdf)

The paper should conform to Turabian style as interpreted by the approved **NOBTS Style Guide**.
