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The mission of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is to equip leaders to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries.

Purpose of Course

The purpose of the course is to equip the seminary student to be an effective youth minister in the local church through an investigation of the distinct characteristics of today's youth culture.

Our Core Values

The seminary has five core values. The focal core value for 2019-2020 is *Spiritual Vitality*. This course supports the five core values of the seminary.

Spiritual Vitality – We are a worshiping community emphasizing both personal spirituality and gathering together as a Seminary family for the praise and adoration of God and instruction in His Word.

Curriculum Competencies Addressed

NOBTS faculty members realize that all ministers need to develop specific competencies if they are going to have an effective ministry. To increase the likelihood of NOBTS graduates having an effective ministry, the faculty developed a competency-based curriculum after identifying seven essential competencies necessary for effective ministry. All graduates are expected to have at least a minimum level of competency in all of the following areas:

Biblical Exposition: to interpret and communicate the Bible accurately.

Christian Theological Heritage: To understand and interpret Christian theological heritage and Baptist polity for the church.

Disciple Making: To stimulate church health through mobilizing the church for missions, evangelism, discipleship, and church growth.

Interpersonal Skills: To perform pastoral care effectively, with skills in communication and conflict management.

Servant Leadership: To serve churches effectively through team ministry.

Spiritual and Character Formation: To provide moral leadership by modeling and mentoring Christian character and devotion.

Worship Leadership: To facilitate worship effectively.

This course will address the following curriculum competencies:

- 1. *Biblical Exposition:* Students will explore biblical admonition to pass on the faith to future generations
- 2. *Disciple Making:* Students will examine the community of faith in which disciples are made, with emphasis on family relationships in the context of the church body.
- 3. Interpersonal Relationships: Students will interact with peers concerning course material.

Course Catalog Description

Personal and social problems of adolescents in the United States are studied. The resources for guiding youth are examined with special emphasis upon the home and the church.

Student Learning Outcomes

The student involved in this course should be able to accomplish the following:

Cognitive:

• Differentiate between normative adolescent challenges and extremes in the youth culture (juvenile delinquency). Identify typical youth concerns through research and discussion.

Affective:

- Develop an empathetic understanding of adolescents within the youth culture.
- Describe current youth culture through personal contact with teenagers.

Psychomotor:

• Suggest implications for youth ministry within and without the local church.

Course Teaching Methodology

The course will involve the following methodologies: reading assignments, reviewing lecture material, individual learning assignments, and online interaction.

Assignments and Evaluation Criteria

1. Reading Assignments: (10%)

See Course Schedule for Due Dates

All reading assignments should be completed prior to the deadline so you can actively engage and process all class materials. The assigned reading for each unit appears in the "Course Schedule" section of the syllabus. Reading is extremely important as the content covered in this class is based on the required reading. Online Blackboard discussion of the reading assignments also shows the level to which you are grasping and applying the course content. A minimum of one to two hours of reading and studying is needed to prepare for each unit. Each student will be asked to report a percentage of the reading you have completed at the end of the course. *This assignment is related*

2. Classroom Participation (20%)

Weekly

You will be presented with questions pertaining to learning units in which you will have to respond and interact with the professor and your classmates. A substantive response should be concise and may include, but not limited to the following: a reflection or personal example on a concept from readings, a different perspective on a topic, a quote from another source that relates to the topic, an experience you had in a ministry that relates to the topic. *This assignment is related to the Cognitive and Psychomotor Student Learning Outcomes*.

NOLA2U Flex students should post questions or comments using either the Echo360 chat feature or email to the professor (dodom@nobts.edu). This is your class participation grade. Post are due each week before midnight on Thursday night.

3. Cultural Trends Report (10%)

Due: Feb. 6

Each student will write a **2-3 page paper** describing "What's Hot/What's Not" in youth culture today. Use articles and research from 2017-2020 which specifically reference Generation Z. Each student will include 10-15 trends. The report must include at least one picture/image, one infographic, and one expert/researcher quote. Include bibliographic information. Possible sources include: market research, Google Scholar, and the CPYU website. *This assignment is related to the Cognitive and Affective Student Learning Outcome*.

4. Journal Article Review (15%)

Due: March 5

Each student will locate an academic (peer-reviewed) journal article concerning one aspect (physical, cognitive, social, moral/spiritual) of Generation Z students. **Write a 3-4 page review** of the research summarizing the conclusions and suggesting application in the local church. For assistance with this assignment, watch the video "How to Search for Journal Articles at NOBTS" on Blackboard and refer to the list of **Peer-Reviewed Journals** in this syllabus. *This assignment is related to the Cognitive and Psychomotor Student Learning Outcomes*.

5. Youth Culture Research (15%)

Due: March 31

Each student will choose an aspect of youth culture from CPYU's website (www.cpyu.com) and write a **3-4 page research paper** on the topic. Include a detailed description of the topic and the important implications of this issue on youth culture. Gather information from textbooks, journal articles, magazines, blogs, videos, television, interviews with teenagers or leaders in the field. A minimum of 6 sources are required (with only 1 from a blog and 1 interview). Cite all sources according to Seminary Style Guide. Submit the paper to Blackboard. *This assignment is related to the Cognitive Student Learning Outcomes*.

6. Youth Culture Articles (20%)

Due: April 28

Using the Youth Culture Research from assignment #5, each student will synthesize the total course content to **write a series of three, 500-700 word articles** that will inform and educate teenagers, parents, and youth workers about the topic/issue. Cite all sources according to Seminary Style Guide. The articles should be well-written and concise, suitable for publication in a blog, magazine, or church newsletter. The series of articles will follow the following pattern:

- Article 1 For Youth presents the facts about the issue and reasons to address it, including examples of the issue in American culture, and a biblical response.
- Article 2 Helping Parents will outline a plan for addressing the issue in the home, including suggested reading or helpful resources.
- Article 3 For Youth Workers will describe how the issue can be addressed in the context of the overall youth ministry.

Submit the three articles as one document to Blackboard. This assignment is related to the Affective and Psychomotor Student Learning Outcome.

7. Final Exam (10%) Due: May 5

Evaluation of Grade

The student's grade will be computed as follows:

All work is due on the assigned date and time in the syllabus. Assignments are due before midnight on the day they are due. Late assignments will be penalized an initial 10 percent penalty and one percent for each day after the due date. No assignments will be accepted more than two weeks after

the original due date. Submit all assignments electronically on Blackboard. Do not send files as attachments via email to the professor.
